SECTION ONE: Reading and Reflection

During the last week in September this year, Fr. Michael Casey, ocso, Scholar, Teacher and Author of many books, gave our Community Seminar. The а topic: Monasticism: Past, Present and Future. Towards the end of the week, he addressed some of the adverse influences in society. which are also problems to be faced within Monastic Communities in the present. For the purpose of this teaching, I am using the term "Monastic" or "Monastics" as meaning Oblates, Nuns or Monks of the Benedictine Order

So, - he notes (among many) two of the adverse influences to be wary of:

- Noise and compulsive communication.
- · Spin and Weasel words.

I want to address the second of these in this edition of "Pax, With The Gospel For Our Guide".

Firstly, for those of us who follow the Rule of St. Benedict, "with the Gospel for our guide", Spin and Weasel Words have no place in our lives. I refer to Don Watson's 2004 Article on Weasel Language. Watson says that in Shakespeare's "As You Like It", Jacques says he can suck melancholy out of a song as a weasel sucks eggs." As we are well aware. Weasels can suck eggs and leave the shells. Watson says that weasel words are words from which life has gone just corpses. He uses the example of two world leaders in the early 21st Century at the beginning of the Iraq War. The President of the United States is to have said: "A search has found weapons of destruction-related program activities." says that at the same time, the Australian Prime Minister asked us to recognize a distinction between "core" and "non-core"

beliefs. Both leaders had sucked the meaning out of words.

Weasel words are words that hide the truth. It is about the manipulation of our language by those with power. Watson quotes George Orwell: "Political language is designed to make truthful and lies sound murder respectable and to give an appearance of solidity to pure wind." And he uses the example of the Newspeak of George Orwell's Novel, 1984. The Newspeak is an invention, but it is also a Satire on real States such as the Soviet Union where death from starvation and abuse in slave camps was recorded by Officials as a "failure of the heart muscle".

Today, weasel language is everywhere. It is, unfortunately, the language of INFORMATION. Watson adds: "A dead, depleted, verb-less jargon is becoming the language of daily life."

Watson also refers to a work called "Death Sentence: The Decay of Public Language". He quotes Morrison as saying "This language (weasel language) must be rejected, altered and exposed." Weasel language is used to deceive, or to avoid having to back up assertions. Weasel words are used to qualify a statement, and so weaken any real truth. An Australian

Fashion Designer, Jessica Wright on her website for May 16th, 2014, notes that "every politician's favourite book is the weasel Dictionary". Whether we agree with her or not, is irrelevant. Our challenge as Monastics, is to combat weasel language and speak only the truth. Weasel language has no part in the life of a monastic.

In Ephesians 6:14-18, we are exhorted to gird ourselves with truth. Speaking the truth may make us the "odd ones" in the crowd. That shouldn't daunt us. Weasel language would say: "I <u>could</u> come with you." (That means you don't commit yourself one way or the other).

Truth would ask: "Would it help if I come with you to your medical appointment?"

"Would it help if I come with you to assist with the work?" And mention the person's name – that really pins you down.

If you are outside a bookstore and a sign says: "Save up to 50% or more..." That is weasel language.

If you are outside a bookstore and books are in a sale bin, and each one has a price on it (not a price that has been marked down) – that is truth. You know how much each one

costs and you can make a decision as to whether you want it and if you can afford it.

The message of both Watson and Morrison in regard to weasel language is that we need to be vigilant.

As Monastics, **vigilance** is already a way of life for us. We keep vigil for the coming of Christ in our "every day".

A text which we can take for Lectio Divina throughout this Season is: "Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer everyone." (Ephesians 4:6).

And: "Show yourself in all respects a model of good deeds, and in your teaching show integrity, gravity, and sound speech that cannot be censured..." (Titus 2:7)

And: "The tree is known by its fruit. Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. The good person, out of good treasure, brings forth good...I tell you, on the day of judgment people will render an account for every careless word they have uttered. By your words you will be justified and by your words you will be condemned." (Matthew 12:33-37).

Alexander Pope wrote in 1711, "Words are like leaves; and where they most abound, much fruit of sense beneath is rarely found."

And before we used the term "weasel words", Herbert Spencer wrote in his Principles of Ethics, 1879 "How often misused words generate misleading thoughts."

Theodore Roosevelt, when President of the U.S. said in 1916 that the "tendency to use what have been called weasel words was one of the defects of the American nation."

As Monastics, embarking once more on the Christmas and Holiday Season, let us resolve to say what we mean and mean what we say. When we come to sending out our Christmas Mail, may we write sincerely and honestly to family and friends, witnessing to our Monastic Life with its values of truth, honesty, integrity and preferring nothing to the love of Jesus Christ.

SECTION TWO: FURTHER READING AND REFLECTION.

Chapter Six of the Rule of St. Benedict is the obvious place to start: Restraint of Speech. So, into our world of "noise and compulsive

communication" comes chapter six, "restraint of speech."

The sins of the tongue are mentioned in verse 1.

Weasel words are often (not always) sins of the tongue.

Sr. Joan Chittister sheds the best light on this Chapter of our Rule in her Book, "The Rule of Benedict – Insights For the Ages". She teaches rightly that "the goal of monastic silence is not non-talking. The goal of monastic silence, and monastic speech, is respect for others, a sense of place, a spirit of peace. The Rule calls for thoughtful talk. When unrestrained (compulsive talk is communication?), when gossip becomes the food of the soul, then the destruction of others can't be far behind." (pages 60 and 61).

We could add: When weasel words become the order of the day, and the empty jargon dominates our lives, then we become, as Watson describes, an empty suit or armour from which the Knight departed long ago! Is this what we want? We do have a choice when it comes to Speech.

SECTION THREE: ABOUT THE RULE OF ST. BENEDICT

G. A. Simon, in his Commentary on the Rule of Benedict, and in particular, on this Chapter notes: "The principles which inspired in St. Benedict the chapter on restraint of speech, are of a general order and are of value for every Christian ...the Holy Scripture long ago reminded us of the mischief of the tongue: "Death and Life – we are in the power of the tongue." (Proverbs). The good deeds and the misdeeds of speech have become commonplace...we must belong to Jesus Christ or to the world."

He also quotes the famous Spiritual Master, Dom Paul Delatte as saying: "It remains true that there are certain subjects, a certain coarseness, a certain worldly tone, which should never enter our conversation...there are matters which one should not touch, which it is wholesome to avoid." (Pages 103-104).

The challenge now is to take this chapter into the 21st century and be vigilant to the use of Weasel Language which is everywhere, and dominates Information Technology. As Monastics we are to resist the deceit of this

Language <u>with vigilance</u>, and expose its deceit.

SECTION FOUR: COMMUNITY HISTORY

It may surprise us to read the following from a Spiritual Notebook kept by one of our Prioresses in the 1930s: "The want of connection between the great words of Christianity and those of everyday life has bewildered and discouraged all of us, at times. Christianity possesses the noblest words in language. Its literature overflows with terms expressive of the great and happiest dispositions which can fill the soul of humankind." What would such a writer say today, as we are faced with the "iargon" of weasel words? So, let us claim the noble language of Christianity, and fight against the "dead, depleted, verb-less jargon which is becoming the language of everyday life." (Watson)
