September, October, November.

More specifically, this edition of "Pax" spans the period from September 1st until the first Sunday of Advent.

SECTIONS ONE AND TWO: READING AND REFLECTION

THEME: IT IS LOVE THAT IMPELS THEM TO PURSUE EVERLASTING LIFE. THEREFORE THEY ARE EAGER TO TAKE THE NARROW ROAD OF WHICH THE LORD SAYS: 'NARROW IS THE ROAD THAT LEADS TO LIFE'. (Matt. 7:14, Rule of St. Benedict 5:10).

This time I have combined Sections One and Two in order to concentrate heavily on one aspect of love.

At the end of April this year, the electric motor which drives our Church Organ broke down and had to be taken away to be repaired. There was no more music from that beautiful Organ for a month.

Love is the electricity that impels us on our Benedictine journey. When it is not there, there is no life, no beautiful music. St. Paul, in 1 Corinthians 13, tells us that love is a lot of things.

This edition of "Pax" will focus on one of those characteristics: "Love is kind..."

In 1859, a book of Spiritual Conferences was published by Thomas Richardson and son, London. The title: "Spiritual Conferences", by Frederick William Faber D.D., Priest of the Oratory of St. Philip Neri. One of these Conferences is on "Kindness".

I have summarized it here:

We have the power to make the world happy. This power is called kindness. Kindness means we put others in place of self.

We treat them as we would wish to be treated ourselves. We change places with them

We cannot speak of kindness without thinking of God, for Creation was an act of Divine kindness.

Kindness adds sweetness to everything. It is kindness which makes life's capabilities blossom, and paints them with their cheerful colours, and endows them with their invigorating fragrance.

Kindness is the nobility of human beings. It is a divine thing rather than a human one, and it is human because it springs from the soul of a person just at the point where the divine image was graven deepest.

Kindness is infectious. No kind action ever stopped with itself.

One kind action leads to another.

The single act of kindness throws out roots in all directions, and the roots spring up and make fresh trees.

The kindest people are generally those who have received the greatest number of kindnesses. Inward happiness almost always follows a kind action.

Kind Interpretations:

Kindness is our best wisdom because it is an image of the wisdom of God. The habit of judging is so nearly incurable, and its cure is such an almost interminable process, that we must concentrate ourselves for a long time on keeping it in check, and this check is to be found in kind interpretations.

The practice of kind thoughts...enables us to find God easily.

The interior beauty of a soul through habitual kindliness of thought is greater than our words can tell. To such a person life is a perpetual bright evening, with all things calm, and fragrant, and restful. The dust of life is laid, and its fever cool. All sounds are softer, as is the way of evening, and all nights are fairer- and the golden light makes our enjoyment of earth a happily pensive preparation for heaven.

Kind Words:

From thoughts we naturally pass to words.

Kind words are the music of the world.

There is hardly a power on earth equal to the power of kind words.

With the help of God's grace, the habit of saying kind words is very quickly formed, and once found, it is not speedily lost.

The more humble we are, the more kindly we shall talk.

A kind-worded person is a genial person. And geniality is power.

A genial person is both an apostle and an evangelist; an apostle, because one brings people to Christ; an evangelist because one brings Christ to other people.

Kind actions:

Like God's goodness, kind actions are constantly occupied where there is no hope of repayment and return.

Like the shedding of precious blood, they have an actual preference for multiplying themselves upon their enemies. Kindness is the spirit of Jesus. Kindness is the turf of the spiritual world, whereon the sheep of Christ feed quietly beneath the Shepherd's eye.

Love is kindness, says St. Paul, and kindness is part of the narrow road that leads to life (Jesus). The journey on this narrow road is impelled by love – the love of Christ. (St. Benedict).

Section Three: About (Concerning) the Rule of St. Benedict.

Reflecting on chapter 5, and on the words, "Love it is that impels them...", Sr. Joan Chittister offers the following insights: Two ideas permeate the Rule of St. Benedict: love and wisdom. Love is the motive; wisdom is the goal and the way. Two great loves, love of God and love of the other, impel us to look outside ourselves and learn from those outside of ourselves where we really are in life. She then speaks of the need for wisdom figures, abbesses, abbots, mentors, spiritual guides, husbands, wives, good friends who love us enough to guide us, and to whom we listen so that we can bear the "heat of life that shapes us, and not ...escape it." Love certainly impels us in all we do as Benedictines, but first of all, love is a commitment.

Love is a commitment to which we are faithful. If we become unfaithful, we haven't much hope of going anywhere on this Benedictine journey.

SECTION FOUR: COMMUNITY HISTORY

During the Great Depression of the 1930s, one of our Lay Sisters, whose work was the Kitchen and the provision of meals for the community, used to give away leftovers to the unemployed men who would sleep at night under the Clyde Railway bridge. They would come down during the day to the back door of the Kitchen, looking for help. A young Priest in Queensland used to send her money for these men, and she would also give them five or ten shillings when she could spare it. This was the work of a kind soul, Sr. Mary Anthony O'Connor, who died on December 22nd, 1950. She too was a Queenslander, born in Toowoomba, so it is possible that the connection was with a young Priest of the Toowoomba Diocese. She is remembered for her many hours scrubbing floors, assisting in the School Infirmary, and washing the hair of the small girl boarders on a Saturday morning. It is also noted in our Chronicles that she wore herself out with hard work, and towards the end of her life, when her mind was wandering, she received much KINDNESS from another sister, Sr. Mary Editha Thompson. Thank God that someone was kind to her after all she had given to the community.

From the writings of Blessed Mother Teresa of Calcutta: "One day I was walking down the street in the middle of London. I saw a tall, thin man on the corner, all huddled up and looking most miserable. I went up to him, shook his hand, and asked him how he was. Then he looked at me and said, 'Oh! After such a long, long, long time, I feel the warmth of a human hand!' And he straightened up. There was such a beautiful smile on his face, because somebody was kind to him. Just shaking his hand, made him feel like somebody. For me, he was Jesus in a distressing disguise. I gave him the joy of being loved, the feeling of being loved by another person. Small things, even a smile, a helping hand, become works of peace."

SECTION EIGHT: FOR REFLECTION:

From the wisdom of Cardinal Basil Hume,. Osb: "We get tired, frustrated, irritated at times, but even so we ought never allow an unkind word to fall from our lips or do an unkind action. Others will forgive us our inadequacies, will not mind our weaknesses, will accept our limitations, if they sense that we will do anything for them because we truly love them. We have to work at it, saying 'no' very often to ourselves, and 'yes' to others. 'If I speak in the tongues of men or angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing.' LOVE IS KIND (St. Paul). IT IS LOVE THAT IMPELS THEM. (St. Benedict).

One of the most inspiring stories we can still read is "The Hiding Place", the story of Betsy and Corrie Ten Boom and their father. When they were sheltering, (in kindness) a young Jewish mother and her baby, and the baby was crying, they needed to find another hiding place. They asked a Pastor and his wife to take the fugitives, because their home was set back from the street within a large wooded park. His answer was: 'No, definitely not. We could lose our lives for a Jewish child!' Mr Ten Boom held the baby close to

his cheek, and said: 'You say we could lose our lives for this child. I would consider that the greatest honour that could come to my family.'

"The Hiding Place" is a timeless story of inspiration and courage. The film is also still available. This is kindness to an amazing degree. We may never be asked to be that kind. However, may we not neglect the small kindnesses of every day. We have the power to change our world for the better. Let us harness that power and set out over these three months to do just that!
