# PAX - WITH THE GOSPEL FOR OUR GUIDE ADVENT/CHRISTMASTIDE (2017-2018) & ORDINARY TIME THROUGH TO ASH WEDNESDAY, FEB 14, 2018.

Pax-With the Gospel for our Guide is sent out to oblates and those who are enrolled in the oblate formation program, **five** times each year. This edition is always number one, being sent out at the beginning of the Church's liturgical year.

#### SECTION ONE: READING AND REFLECTION

For many years now, our Sr. Elizabeth (91), has been saying: "St. Benedict says, 'Whoever you are..." She has encouraged many sisters over many decades, to hold on, and not (in the words of Benedict), run away at the outset, because it is hardgoing. St. Paul had the same message: "Not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth; but God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise. God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong. God chose what is low and despised in the world...to bring to nothing things that are, so that no one can boast in the presence of God. God is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, whom God made our wisdom, our sanctification and our redemption." (1 Corinthians 1:26-31).

You may prefer a different translation from your own bible.

Everyone should be given a chance. Certainly, St. Benedict gave every person a chance, (be it the sons of noble families or ex-barbarian army men), asking only one question: "Is there anyone here who yearns for life and desires to see good days? (Ps. 33:13) If I answer "yes" to the question, God speaks further to me, saying: "If you desire true and eternal life, keep your tongue free from vicious talk and your lips from all deceit; turn away from evil and do good; let peace be your quest and aim. (Ps. 33:14-15). Here is the challenge of the Benedictine life, because it encompasses the rest of the Benedictine Rule: silence, love, (tough love from time to time), compassion, kindness, *lectio divina*, the liturgy of the hours, the way we work, our preference for Christ above all; good zeal; mutual obedience. With your copy of the holy rule, take up some of these texts and do a personal assessment on where you are now in your Benedictine journey in accordance with the commitment you made however many years ago, answering St. Benedict's question in the prologue. It's a way of nailing things down.

The first assessment would be one's tongue. This assessment could be done side by side with the letter of James chapter 3:6-18. I have prayed so often and so long with this text over my life, and yet I so easily fall back into things I wish I hadn't said.

Are there things you wish you hadn't said? Negative words you've passed on?

St. Benedict targets tongues and lips first up. No doubt he too had trouble. The fact that he targets tongues and lips and the damage they are capable of doing, seems to say that if, with God's help, we master this area, then we will be fit to go on.

# SECTION TWO: FURTHER READING AND REFLECTION.

Because Advent is the beginning of a new Liturgical year, may we ask: How is our prayer holding up?

The two pillars of prayer in the Benedictine Rule are:

- Liturgy of the Hours
- Lectio Divina

One might ask: "Where is the Eucharist?" The editors of RB 80 have a lengthy explanation on this subject. We can sum it up as: "Communio occurs in RB 38:2 in the phrase post missas et communionem. Adalbert de Vogue (probably the greatest scholar of the Benedictine Rule in the 20<sup>th</sup> century), seems to think this phrase means after Mass and Communion. Since the invitation of St. Benedict is to everyone who yearns for life, so the invitation to become an Oblate of St. Benedict is to all who yearn for life. The Oblate community is an ecumenical community. The prerequisite is that one is baptized a Christian. Obviously, one wouldn't want to become an oblate if this wasn't first in place – the mark of Christ on each of us. While some faiths have the Eucharist, all faiths have the lived Communio in their ministry to the Body of Christ in the sick, the lonely, the disabled, the poor, the socially isolated, the homeless and hungry. If we take the Incarnation seriously, then we have this in common.

Christmas and the holiday season is the time which challenges us to reach out to Christ as present through the Mystery of the Incarnation. We all want to stay with the nativity scene in our churches, but what of Jesus present in the other who needs me and calls me forth? What am I doing this Christmas and this holiday season to give a little of my time to the needy?

#### SECTION THREE: ABOUT THE RULE OF ST. BENEDICT

Two books by Bl. Columba Marmion are available in our bookstore. These are deeply spiritual, probably best if you are a good way along your Benedictine journey:

- 1. Christ the Life of the Monk it will lead you to the riches of the Benedictine Rule.
- 2. Christ the Life of the Soul a more general work of Christological beauty.

If you yet haven't read "The Life and Miracles of St. Benedict", it is available in our store now. (The Life and Miracles of St. Benedict, by St. Gregory the Great, Dom Edmund J. Luck, Ed).

A challenge is also available for the more studious of our oblates:

- 1. "A Critical Study of the Rule of Benedict, Vol 1" by Adalbert de Vogue, the greatest scholar of the Benedictine Rule in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.
- 2. A beautiful book is: "Portraits of Monastic Oblates", edited by Linda Kulzer and Roberta Bondi.

#### Other books include:

- 1. "Wisdom. The Good Life Wisdom, Liturgy and the Rule of St. Benedict", by Irene Nowell.
- 2. "A Tree Full of Angels: Seeing the Holy in the Ordinary" is truly beautiful. It is written by Macrina Wiederkehr osb.
- 3. Our list wouldn't be complete without a reference from Joan Chittister. Her book, "The Breath of the Soul, Reflections on Prayer", is most enlightening and encouraging, no matter where we are on our journey.

#### **SECTION FOUR: COMMUNITY HISTORY**

Our last entry in this section (Pax Pentecost II), finished with Foundation Day, February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1849. So, we carry on with the next installment of our history: The women who entered on that day were: **Alicia Lett** and **Elizabeth Burrows**. These two women entered to be Choir Nuns. Alicia became Sr. Benedict. She was one of seven children of Helen and John Lett, Irish Immigrants, who came to

Australia on the "Ann" of 1839. Elizabeth (Eliza on the shipping records) was the second youngest child of Stephen Burrows and Mary Kennedy of Co. Longford, Ireland. She was four years old when her family emigrated on H.M.S. "Cleopatra" in 1828. Elizabeth became Sr. Placida, the feminine of Placid, one of Benedict's disciples (Feast Day – Jan. 15).

Susannah and Margaret Diamond who entered to be Lay Sisters, were born in Ireland. It is possible they came to Australia and worked as domestic servants in Sydney before entering our community. Their ages, 36 and 45 respectively would indicate a previous working life. Alicia Lett's mother was a talented, educated woman, and ran a school at 15 Upper Fort Street in Sydney. It was advertised as a school for young women. Agnes Hart, one of the first women to enter the Good Samaritan Congregation, was educated at this school.

#### **SECTION FIVE: LITURGY**

Advent begins a new Liturgical Year: The Sunday Liturgy readings take Year B, and Weekdays take Year 2.

The 'O' Antiphons begin on December 17.

Christmas Midnight mass at Jamberoo Abbey is preceded by the traditional monastic Vigil at 10.45 p.m. You are invited to this traditional Vigil and then to the singing of carols preceding Midnight Mass. The Vigil takes an hour, the Carols just fifteen minutes before Midnight.
