PAX – WITH THE GOSPEL FOR OUR GUIDE LENT, 2019

The Lenten Journey is not about "giving up things", it is about be-coming more than we are. The Lenten Journey is a spiritual journey, given to us each year as a time of renewal. Let us think about be-coming more than we are, not about depriving ourselves of "things". When we limit the Lenten Journey to a time of deprivation, we lose the whole meaning of the Season. On the other hand, if giving up something helps us to become a better person, more Christian, more peaceful, gentle and so on, then that deprivation is positive.

SECTION ONE: READING AND REFLECTION

I have chosen the theme: "Fast from and feast on." I found it on a card left in our Monastic Library by Sr. Mellitus, who died in February 2018. She was Librarian for a number of years. The card simply says: "From a Benedictine website".

Numerous kinds of fasting are spelt out here. They are all more difficult to do than fasting from food:

- Fast from judging others; feast on the Christ dwelling in them.
- Fast from emphasis on differences; feast on the unity of life.
- Fast from thoughts of illness; feast on the healing power of God.
- Fast from words that pollute; feast on words that purify.
- Fast from discontent; feast on gratitude.
- Fast from anger; feast on patience.
- Fast from worry; feast on Divine Providence.
- Fast from complaining; feast on appreciation.
- Fast from bitterness; feast on forgiveness.
- Fast from self-concern; feast on compassion for others.
- Fast from discouragement; feast on hope.
- Fast from lethargy; feast on enthusiasm.
- Fast from shadows of sorrow; feast on the sunlight of serenity.
- Fast from idle gossip; feast on purposeful silence.
- Fast from problems that overwhelm; feast on prayer than undergirds.

Resist the urge to dive in and take on every "Fast from..." That is not the way. In fact we will lose the way this Lent if we take on every "fast from..."

Instead take one only, - but one in which you can see yourself as in a mirror. Each one of us will know what is right for us this Lent.

For many Catholics, discouragement is the big one at the moment. It is hard to "feast on hope", as we look around us at the aftermath and lingering destruction of the sexual abuse scandal.

The last "fast from" is helpful for monastics who hold authority, and the problems that go with authority.

A very interesting "fast from" is the third one. I have never seen that written before, and yet, we can all indulge in thoughts of illness, especially as we age. Some of us have ill-health associated with ageing. We feel sorry for ourselves. We may even moan and groan about it. Yes, number three is helpful: "Fast from thoughts of illness; feast on the healing power of God."

Crothers argues that the future lies in clergy and laity collaborating in shaping the future of the church with mutual respect, dialogue and deep listening."

SECTION THREE: ABOUT THE RULE OF ST. BENEDICT

Chapter Four of the Rule is where we need to be this Lent.

The following verses of chapter four link directly with one of the "fast from..." verses at the beginning:

Verses 1, 7, 8, 9, 18, 19, 22, 23, 24, 25, 29, 30, 31, 32, 39, 40, 41, 51, 52, 74.

When you are doing *Lectio Divina* each day, take one of these verses. Just one – even one per week, and ponder on the exhortation of each verse.

Verse 20 of Chapter four tells us: "Your way of acting should be different from the world's way."

In "The Rule of St. Benedict, Insights for the Ages", Sr. Joan Chittister comments: "The end of Benedictine spirituality is to develop a transparent personality. Dissimulating, half answers, vindictive attitudes, a false presentation of self are all barbs in the soul of the monastic." (page 51)

If we claim to be monastics, then that's what we have to be: Monastics!

SECTION FOUR: COMMUNITY HISTORY

On February 11, following a community discernment led by Br Ian Cribb SJ, the community faced the election of a new Abbess. On the fourth ballot, Sr. Hilda Scott was elected.

The Prioresses and Abbesses throughout history have been:

Mother Walburge Wallis (1864-1902)

Mother Ignatius Harnett (1902-1915)

Mother Mary Joseph Brady (1915-1947).

Mother Mildred Potts (1947-1968)

Mother Placid Wilson (1968-1980)

Mother **Benedicta Philips**, elected Prioress in 1980. The Monastery was raised to the status of an Abbey in 1982, and there was another election for an Abbess on November 10, 1982. Mother Benedicta Philips was elected again, and became the first Abbess in the community's history. She was abbess from 1982 until her sudden death in 2006.

Mother **Mary Barnes** was elected second abbess of the community on November 21, 2006. She was abbess until February 10, 2019.

Bishop Brian Mascord presided over the election on Feb . 11, 2019. He was assisted by Fr. Paul Gurr, Chaplain of the Jamberoo community.
