PAX - WITH THE GOSPEL FOR OUR GUIDE POST-PENTECOST 1 2022

Covering the period from Pentecost Sunday until August 31

SECTION ONE: Reading and Reflection

Theme: The Psalter

The 150 Psalms which comprise the Psalter are described by Chouraqi as: "A small book; 150 poems; 150 steps between life and death; 150 mirrors of our rebellions and our loyalties, of our agonies and our resurrections. More than a book, it is a living being who speaks, who suffers, groans and dies, who rises again and speaks on the threshold of eternity; who seizes one, bears one away, oneself and all the ages of time, from the beginning to the end." Nathan A. Chouraqi died in 2007. He was a lawyer, writer, translator of biblical texts, a member of the Zionist league and a scholar with too many doctorates and degrees to count.

Joseph Gelinau, more well-known to us, was a Jesuit priest and composer. He worked on a great number of musical settings for Psalms, resisting ultra-modern liturgical music which often labelled a song with words such as "based on verse 2 of Psalm 64", as if that qualified it for use in the liturgy. I have found his teaching to be sound: "The Psalms may overwhelm or shock, bring peace or exaltation, but inevitably they draw us beyond ourselves; they force us to that meeting with God without whom we cannot live and who transforms our whole life. The Psalms compel us to faith and hope."

And then there is another obstacle for some of us: We may object that certain passages contradict the command of love taught to us by Christ. Surely, we've all thought this. Joseph Gelinau goes on to say that: "...we have only to follow the images through to their Easter fulfilment in Christ's Passover, and to ask ourselves what it is that the psalmist loves and hates to realize that the choice no longer lies between friends or enemies, but between the reign of evil which holds sway in us and the reign of grace which lays claim to us."

Others raise different objections: They don't care to join the psalmist in proclaiming their own innocence or loyalty; they don't want to pray in terms of an anguish they have not experienced or give thanks with a jubilation they have never felt. But do such people think that the prayers they use are their own prayers? Do they not realize that they stand before God in the company of the whole of humanity. Their prayer is that of the whole Church and it only reaches the Father through the voice of Christ the mediator.

The Psalms compel us to voice all the prayer of the people of God and of their Head. The psalms force us to widen our hearts to the full dimensions of the redemption.

I have an Ecumenical Psalter in French, a gift from one of my sisters who was living in Paris in the 1980s. The notes in the front of the book say that "the Psalms are the highest form of Christian prayer."

If we can't see this, we need to go back over the teaching of A. Couragi and Joseph Gelinau.

SECTION TWO: Further Reading and Reflection

We are Benedictine monastics, and so we pray the Liturgy of the Hours, consisting mostly of Psalms and the Sacred Scriptures.

Sr. Joan Chittister says, "The purpose of communal prayer [or the prayer of one Benedictine monastic] is to read the psalms and the Scriptures together over and over every day – in every monastery, [home] until they sink into our souls like the air we breathe. It is the daily drip, drip, drip of the Scriptures into the hearts and minds of every member of the community...that forms the heart and soul of the Monastic." (The Monastic Heart, page 41).

SECTION THREE: About the Rule of St. Benedict

The Rule of Benedict gives 19 chapters to the Liturgy of the Hours. Benedict is precise about the number of psalms, the arrangement of each hour, the hymns.

Before 1967, the Liturgy of the Hours in Benedictine monasteries was uniform everywhere and followed the psalm distribution given in the Rule. It was in Latin, and without pauses.

Sr. Elizabeth says that into "this very peaceful arrangement there came rumblings of change and also a sense of anticipation as well as apprehension. What a marvellous change it would be to have the Liturgy of the Hours in English at last! But then, what we already had in Latin and plain chant was so beautiful. It would surely be a long road before we could experience the same beauty with the Liturgy in English."

The work of the Benedictine Confederation: Permission from the Benedictine Confederation to make changes in the Liturgy of the Hours was given first to monks and later to nuns and sisters (1968). There were definite stipulations and conditions. Two areas came to notice immediately: the option of choosing a different psalm schema from that in the Rule of Benedict, and the option of replacing the three Little Hours with one or two. The Confederation actually provided the schemas that would make this transition peaceful. (schema is Latin for scheme).

Four psalm schemas were provided so that monasteries could make their own choice, provided that the 150 psalms were covered within two weeks.

- Schema as in the Rule of Benedict.
- Schema Fuglister
- Schema Scheyern
- Scheme OCSO (Cistercian)

Scheyern Abbey provided a thorough analysis of their background reasons for every part of their choice – so that we could see immediately that our own particular preferences and needs would be best met by adopting this. We also preferred a two-week cycle so that priority could be given to prayerfulness rather than to quantity. We voted at that time to replace the three Little Hours with a single Midday Hour. Reasons for this were earning a living and caring for the sick and elderly.

These changes were implemented in February 1973. They had a very beautiful and appropriate beginning as Sr. Moira Bradshaw OSB composed new antiphons for every daily 'hour', and we had seven booklets for each complete liturgical day. Sr. Moira, who entered in 1926, had graduated from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. She embodied a spirit of quiet enthusiasm and devotedness and her part in the whole changeover was pivotal, because the older community had confidence in her judgment.

*Notker Fügilister was a Catholic theologian and author. He wrote: 'The Genres of the Religious Lyric of Israel'; 'The Psalms of the Return, Book V Psalms 107-150; Israel's Sacred

Songs: A Study of Dominant Themes' (1966); 'Glory at the right hand. Psalm 110 in Early Christianity'; 'The Moral Sttributes of God in the Psalms. (1971); 'Songs from a Strange Land: Psalms 42-51 (1979). Most likely, all of these books are out of print, but would be available on e-bay or in a theological library.

*Scheyern Abbey is in Bavaria. It was founded in 1050. This Abbey has an historic brewery, making "Helles Lager, and Dunkles (dark beer).

SECTION FOUR: Community History

When the Psalms are chanted in the monastic choir, the musical accompaniment is simple and gentle, allowing the prayer to find a home deeply within the monks giving awareness of the great and miraculous prayer that is taking place. We have an interesting story in our Chronicles concerning plain chant, which, according to the leaders of the 19th century monastic revival, is the chant which converts. "A student from Rome, who had studied plain chant under Monsignor Antonio Rella, conductor of the Sistine Choir, was visiting Sydney, Australia in 1903-1904. Wallington, had entered a convent of nuns in Rome. The convent had been disbanded for reasons not given in our Chronicles. Miss Wallington saw in Subiaco (our first home), the monastic home she had lost. She entered the community and stayed for two years. While there, she trained the nuns, and particularly, the musicians of the house, in the art of plain chant. She departed for England when her father died and her mother was in need of her care. Before her departure, Mother Ignatius Harnett (Second elected Prioress), asked her who would be the best qualified to take over the monastic choir, and keep up the tradition which was Miss Wallington named Sr. Mary Joseph (Hilda) Brady. When established. Monsignor Antonio Rella visited Subiaco in 1922, he complimented the Prioress (by this time, Mother Mary Joseph Brady), on the monastic choir. He was not aware that one of his own students had made a significant contribution from 1904-1906.
